## Resurrection Thinking

Recently a friend had a bruising experience of professional life. An unwritten line in the sand had been crossed and, after much thought, he decided to say something. It didn't go well: at the meeting of the senior team the colleague who had supported speaking up was suddenly not so supportive. And afterwards the boss gave him one of those 'the problem with you' talks – the problem being that my friend, in the boss's view, just expected too much of people. Another friend has been journeying with an asylum seeker for many months. This week she found out that the request for re-settlement had been denied. 'I don't understand how my country can do this', she laments.

Many of us will have had an experience of betrayal – a time when we look at the person we thought we knew and we can't recognise them. When we lie awake at night wondering how they can be sleeping after what they have done, how they have acted or what they have said. The hurt of disappointment and betrayal can crush the spirit and leave a little, small cry of 'I just don't understand'. Our hearts can hold on to these 'little' death stories for a long time.

Over these past days we have been invited to once again enter into the two-thousand-year-old sacred story of the passion, the death and the resurrection of Jesus. I suspect it is easier for many of us to relate to the passion and death part: this is a story with which we are familiar from our own life experience. We know only too well what it means to be bruised and beaten by life, to be let down by those around us and to experience loss and disappointment. This is the story of suffering, this is the story of life, we may think. This is the story of Good Friday as we move to venerate and recognise the cross with bowed heads, a touch, a kiss, sometimes a solemn nod. We all have our sorrows to place on the bowed shoulders of the Christ figure.

We identify with the disciples – the surprise of being served by one who leads; losing our nerve when put to the test; the feeling of absolute loss in the face of the death of the beloved. And yet.

This is a sacred story that ends with us moving on. This

is a story of an empty tomb, a story that tells us not to remain with the death and darkness but to look toward life. And so, on Easter night, we lit our candles from the Paschal candle and gradually filled our darkened church with light; where we had brought our lives to the cross, we now brought our lives to the font of blessed water and we moved back into life as Easter people.

And yes, it does seem incredible that someone can rise from the dead. It is indeed one of the great mysteries of our faith. But is it really? We know, also from our own lives, that just as great suffering is possible, so is great joy. That from the darkest of times in life there are glimpses of light that gradually become stronger. That the broken relationship can heal, perhaps not always in the way we had imagined. That the dream we thought was lost can be brought back to life in a new way. That the seed that in the dark earth was sown can do its sacred work and bring forth life. That our cries of abandonment are answered when our eyes are open and our hearts are ready. This, too, is the lived experience upon which generations of Christians have based their lives. This is the world of resurrection thinking.

In April 2017, Pope Francis observed the following: "Yes, because each of us has a small tomb, some area that is a little bit dead inside the heart: a wound, an injury suffered or done (to us), a bitterness that does not let up, remorse that returns, a sin that you cannot overcome. ... We identify these today, our little tombs we have inside and invite Jesus there."

So perhaps this is something we can take into our hearts as we once again enter into this paschal mystery – that the stone is always rolled away – that our little tombs can be opened to enable us to live in hope. That Christian thinking is Resurrection thinking. It's about rebirth, renewal, reawakening, it's about a quiet confidence that even in the midst of the suffering times God is with us and that hope will dawn.

And that this is why we can proclaim, and at times just hold onto, the Good News that Jesus, who once was dead, is alive. Alleluia!

### Stewardship Corner - thoughts on Giving.


"The community of believers was of one heart and mind, and no one claimed that any of his possessions was his own..." – ACTS 4:32

### Reading 1

### Acts 3:13-15, 17-19

Peter said to the people:

"The God of Abraham,

the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob,

the God of our fathers, has glorified his servant

Jesus,

whom you handed over and denied in Pilate's

presence

when he had decided to release him.

You denied the Holy and Righteous One

and asked that a murderer be released to you.

The author of life you put to death,

but God raised him from the dead; of this we are witnesses.

Now I know, brothers,

that you acted out of ignorance, just as your leaders did:

but God has thus brought to fulfillment what he had announced beforehand through the mouth of all the prophets,

that his Christ would suffer.

While they were still incredulous for joy and were amazed, he asked them, "Have you anything here to eat?"

They gave him a piece of baked fish; he took it and ate it in front of them.

He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled."

Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures.

# Reflection

# The wounds of love

Those who care about others pick up a lot of wounds. There may be no great wounds, only a multiplicity of little ones - a host of scratches, wrinkles and welts. But there can also be a lot of invisible wounds: the furrows left on the mind and the heart by hardship, worry and anxiety, disappointments, ingratitude, and betrayal. These wounds are not things to be ashamed of. They are badges of honour.

They are the proof of our love.

Jesus didn't hide his wounds.

Neither should we.

By his wounds we are healed.
